### **\*MEMBER INFORMATION\***

May is here and that means that we will be training outside on Wednesday and Thursdays in the Macungie Park. Please be sure to check your emails and also the website to see if there are any changes in times. If it is too hot or storming, we may cancel the outdoor training.

Be aware that some dogs need time to adjust to training outdoors. There are lots of distractions which is not necessarily a bad thing, but they need to understand that they are to pay attention to you and not what is going on around them. So do not be discouraged if your dog is not as well trained outdoors as he or she was in the building.

We have some exciting events coming up. Our match show in December was quite successful and our first match of this year will be over by the time you receive this newsletter. Phyllis is planning on running more so be sure to check your emails each week to see when one is scheduled. We urge everyone to take advantage of these run thrus no matter how far along you are in your training. It is a great experience to get into a ring situation for both you and your dog. There is a "judge" but you are not judged unless you wish to be. The judge may give you suggestions and things like that but we try to let the dog know that it is not a scary thing but can be fun for both of you. At our Seminar in November with Betsy Scapicchio and Linda Brennan, they showed us a lot of ways we can play with our dogs in the ring, including things we can do between exercises. We repeated a previous Match Show article in last month's newsletter so it might be a good idea to go over it again.

### **\*APRIL MATCH SHOW\***

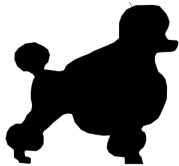
### **\*ACHIEVEMENTS\***

## **Applying for Membership to ADTC**

Effective immediately anyone wishing to join ADTC, in addition to taking a proficiency test, must take one paying session of ADTC club training, whether it is beginner novice, novice, open or utility. The cost of this session is \$160 for 7 weeks of club training.

For the novice, open and utility sessions, 7 vouchers will be issued to each proposed member to be used in these classes. As they attend a class, they will provide the trainer with a voucher. The trainer will have the name of the person and will take the voucher. This voucher will then be put in the money box.

The proposed new member will fill out a Training Application and a Membership Application, paying the yearly dues as well as the 7 week session. The membership application will be processed in the normal way, eliminating the \$10 application fee.

## **\*EDITOR'S COMMENT\***

This is something I hesitate to write about but I feel that it is necessary. Many of our long time members, the ones who have been members many years before Debbie and I, remember when obedience trials had 30 or 40 dogs in Novice!! Those days, at this point, seem to be over. Clubs also seem to be hurting for money and volunteers and not just a few are cancelling obedience trials especially if they are a breed club. I am on several discussion groups which I mentioned above. Bottom line is in many of the discussions is the lack of entries, especially in Novice A and a few of the other A classes, but mainly the Novice A classes. Obedience keeps losing people every year for various reasons but for the older folks it is age related as well as health. There seems to be younger folks who are working in obedience but not enough. Our club has seen the same problems. We offer classes on many levels from Beginning Novice on up to Utility. But how many members, other than the instructors, encourage some of our new members to think beyond Beginning Novice and Rally, to encourage them to go further, to enjoy the wonderful partnership you can have with your dog. I hope that our older (not necessary by age) members take the time to encourage and even mentor newer trainers. We should not be discouraging people but encouraging people to join and take classes. Training your dog to the higher levels does take a lot of time and commitment but in the long run it is worth it. You are two different creatures, who do not speak the same language, but yet are able to communicate with each other on a high level. What a wonderful thing that is!! I remember many years ago at Canine Learning watching Utility dogs working and I thought how impressive it was to see both dog and handler working together as a team and it brought tears to my eyes. I never dreamed that years later, I would be doing the same thing as those dogs and handlers did years ago.

So let us not make it so difficult to become a part of our club. Let us encourage our newer members, to come to training as often as they can. Life does, at times, have a way of getting in the way of things that we want to do. Encourage and help members who are having problems getting their dog to do what they would like them to do. Maybe some newer members are just coming for the social aspect and to train their dog. And that is fine. But who knows, they may wind up getting "bit by the bug" as Debbie and I did some years ago. I would like to see all of us



make an effort to help the new members and most importantly help those who are potential members become members. Let us make it a point to make all feel welcome. They care about their four-legged friend or they would not be interested in joining us. Give your dog a hug and see you at training. Remember, it is outside.
